“I was the principal of Colonel By High School for 4 years, and then I was the principal of Adult High School. And when I was the principal of Adult, I was also the principal of all the alternate sites, the two prisons, and the family reception center. Then I went to Holland, and I was the principal of the NATO school, the Canadian NATO school, in Holland, and then I came back here.”

How long have you been principal at Glebe? (total amount of years)

“Well, I was principal for five years, then I became a Superintendent, and then last spring, I was here for three months as the vice

Sam Morrier has taken Glebe's fashion scene by storm.

The eleventh-grader is the creator and designer of Goreson Jeans, a local streetwear brand that fuses the styles of 2000s oversized denim with graffiti-inspired motifs and wordmarks. Morrier, who counts designers Shawn Stussy (Stüssy), and Clint419 (Corteiz) among his influences, created Goreson as a memorial to a dear friend.

“I started Goreson after my best friend Max took his own life in February of last year,” said Morrier in a recent interview.

“He and I were very into Graffiti and street art. His tag was GORE, which later changed to GORESON. I had expressed my dream of starting a clothing brand to Max, and he was always very supportive... So I decided to continue Max's legacy by creating Goreson. He was my biggest inspiration and best friend.”

All of Goreson's designs are hand-painted or embroidered, and each pair is entirely unique.



Morrier is optimistic about the growth of Goreson. "I intend to take the brand as far as it can possibly go. I know Max would have loved to see me succeed, and I want to make him proud. I also want to share Max's story and help people struggling with depression. I don't just want to create a successful brand, I want to save lives."

On the subject of a dream co-sign, he isn't sure. "Really any celebrity would be cool. (Playboi) Carti, Travis Scott. That type of thing. I don't really have a full answer yet."

Goreson's Autumn collection is scheduled to release Saturday, October 14th, on the brand's Instagram, @goresonjeans. It is subject to change.

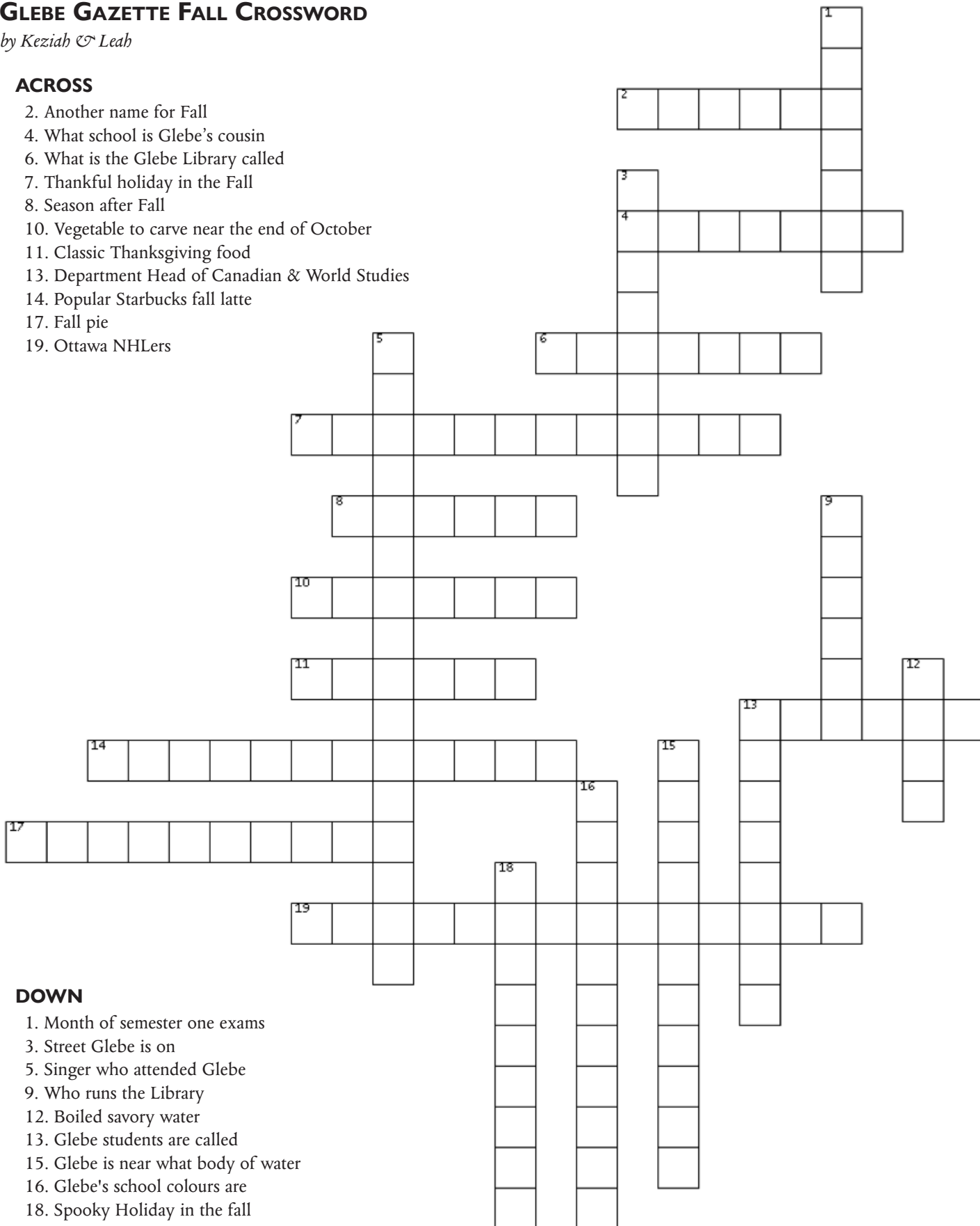

CAFÉ REVIEW: BLACK SQUIRREL

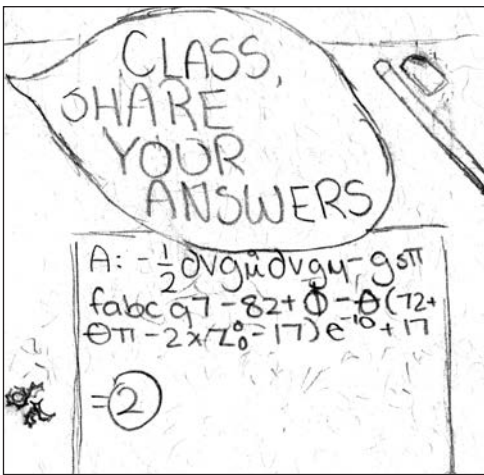

Black Squirrel is a very relaxing and welcoming environment, as the rustic furniture and bookshelves lining the walls create the perfect ambiance. When you approach the counter to order, there are a wide variety of delicious breakfast foods,

Whether you're looking to buy or sell music, looking for updates on Ottawa's underground music scene, or wanting to connect with community events, Vertigo is an easy access hub for music lovers of all interests.

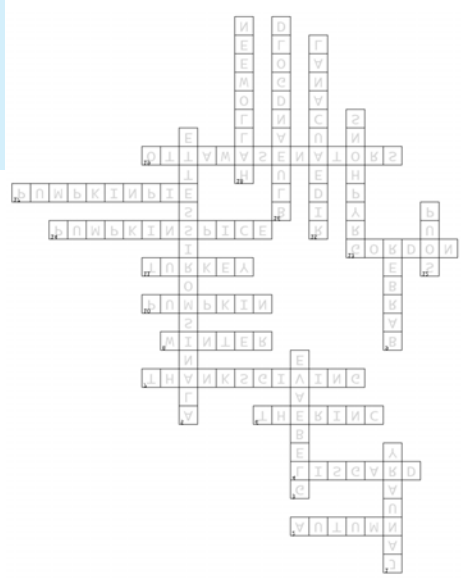

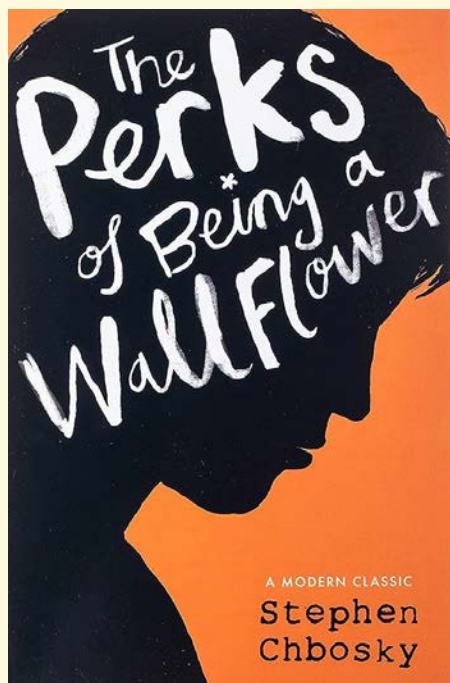

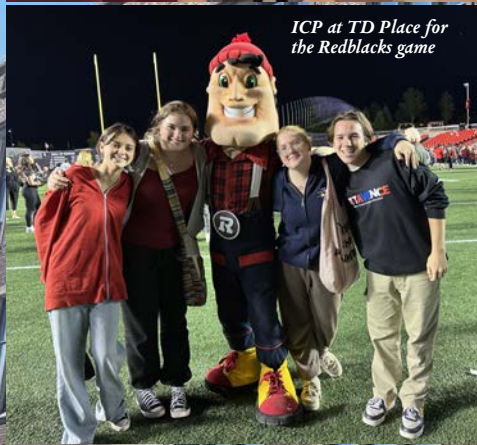
