AN INTERVIEW WITH JULIA SPEIRS

What was your inspiration for this project? What made you think of it?


We had to think of an original idea, and honestly, it's simple and classic, but it's doable. Although, one specific part (on the back) was kind of inspired by the bouncy shoes in Subway Surfers, which is too cool.

How did you make it? What techniques did you use?

I made it out of cardboard. We had made other shoes previously in design tech with cardboard where we all used the same pattern, so I copied the style of the pattern but obviously the pieces were different dimensions and such. I made a paper version first, and then I taped it all up into the shape that it would be as a shoe, just to make sure they all fit together, and then I made a few adjustments. I started to cut it out of cardboard, using the paper as a stencil. Then, I glued that together, primed it, painted it, etc.

What was the biggest challenge you faced when creating it?

Well, with the previous design project we had a very clear vision of what it was



going to look like, and he [Mr. Hobson] had made it before, but with this one, I had to make the pattern and adjustments myself. So nothing was guaranteed going to work, and you didn't really know how it was going to turn out. Also, the materials, and figuring out how I was going to make it bounce and actually work.

What's your favorite part/what are you most proud of?

The part that I'm most proud of is definitely the springs. I was thinking at first, 'Oh it doesn't actually have to be bouncy, it just has to look like it has springs' so I was going to use slinkies and then I thought, 'I might as well find springs' but I couldn't find the right kind so I had to make them myself, and I am really proud of that. It worked out really well—they can actually be used as springs—and so when the whole shoe was put together, it actually bounced. I was really proud that it actually worked, and so technically, you could probably actually bounce in that shoe.

What, in general, inspires you to do art?

Pinterest? And also, it's really fun! Once I get into a project, it's all I want to do. It kind of motivates itself, if that makes sense. Once this one was started, at first I thought, "What the heck am I doing??" but then once it started and I could see what it was going to become, I wanted to finish it and see it work out. I wanted to see the completed project. Art in general doesn't have to be perfect, so it can be calming and entertaining also. But in general, my idea of what the finished product is going to be is what motivates me.

Ultimately, this shoe demonstrates the creativity of Glebe's students and the possibilities that lie within some courses. Next time you are selecting courses, consider taking a tech class, you never know the kind of interesting pieces you could create!

GLEBE'S PERSPECTIVES ON DISPLAY AT THE WILD OAT

Wild Oat, located at 819 Bank St, is a staple in the Glebe community. This cozy bakery/cafe specializes in fresh, health-conscious food and pastries in an art-filled space. If you happened to stop by in May, you would have seen the walls covered in colourful city drawings, all created by students here at Glebe.

Over 20 years ago, Kelly Clouer, a former Glebe teacher, began their relationship with the Wild Oat, and the store has been showcasing the work of Glebe's art classes ever since. Every May and November, the art students at Glebe display their pieces at the local cafe on Bank Street. The art varies from visual art to technological art, and everything in between. Each new display houses a new grade's artwork.

This May, the grade 9's created 3-point perspective city drawings, a project familiar to anyone who took art in their first year of high school. According to Mr. Hobson, these artworks take about 15 hours to draw, and 5-10 hours to colour, a very significant amount of time.

"When we make substantial pieces of art, it becomes part of our personal story, it's an artifact that we carry forward," said Mr. Hobson, who has kept these exhibits going since Mr. Clouer retired in 2010. "Art is always going to outlast us, but more impor-

tantly, it outlasts the moment that we are in."

He spoke about how the artwork we create in school becomes a reference to a time in our lives when we're older.

"I've heard stories from other students, that when they come back from college and see their drawing, it reminds them of what it was like when they were 14 or 15, at a completely different time in their life."

Regulars of the Wild Oat have become familiar with Glebe's artwork, and it has become a part of their daily routine. Between looking at them while having a morning coffee, talking about their favourites, and anticipating the new art pieces, the art exhibits have contributed greatly to the community lifestyle at the Wild Oat.

In November 2023, the grade 10 art technology class designed and built their own shoes that were put on display. These shoes were chock-full of creativity, some with springs on the bottom and others with fun vibrant colours. The other art pieces on display were the wire figures also created by the grade 10s. These figurines are a part of life drawings using the 8-head theory, which is a method in which the size or length of the head is used to measure the height and width of a figure. The figurines were placed in a circle holding hands, inspired by the scene in The Grinch when all the Whos unite around the Christmas Tree.

There's no doubt Glebe is filled with talented artists, and we are so fortunate to be able to see their pieces on display at the local cafe. Next November, be sure to head on down to Wild Oat and check out the next cycle of art!

How does it feel to win "GOAT Teacher" in Glebe's 2024 Oscars?

I think that any award that recognizes you for something you love doing and that you feel like you are meant to do just underscores the impact that you have and validates that what you're doing is reaching people on a deeper level. At the end of the day, it's about relationships, and winning this award just shows that

the relationships I have with my students are ones that they see value in.

Tell us a bit about your career as a teacher.

I've wanted to be a teacher since I was a kid. I remember being asked in grade two, "What is it that you want to do?", and I said I wanted to be either a mom or a teacher; I have been very fortunate to be both. I started teaching in 2009 and I have been at Glebe since 2011. I taught a year at Hillcrest before I came here as a very new teacher."

What are your highlights to date as a teacher at Glebe?

I think the thing that stands out to me is the insane community at this school. You walk into the school and you feel palpable love and there's a space for anyone, and if there isn't, there's an openness to create that space. Relationships are treasured, people help each other out, and the camaraderie between students is also seen in staff. Everybody realizes that community is the most important and the heart of this school.

What is your proudest achievement outside of your career?

My proudest achievement outside of school is my family. I'm a firm believer in [that] you work in a building and spend so much time building a community, when you go home, the community you have within the four walls of your home is actually the most impactful. I'm a mom to two boys who are high-energy, they are insanely kind and generous. Being a mom and being able to watch them grow into who they are meant to be and supporting that, has been the greatest joy of my life.

If you could only read one book for the rest of your life, what would it be?

There is this one book that I read last summer, it was called *Man's Search for Meaning* and it tells the story of a man who lived through a concentration camp. While it seems like a heavy topic, the things that I continually pulled out from there are: hope exists no matter how dark you see your future and everybody has a purpose and it's up to us to figure out

what it is and how we can align our lives with what we're meant to be doing.

impressive. Donaldson's beats are smooth and 808 heavy, evoking modern producing frontrunners like Pierre Bourne and BYNX. Linder's videos fit their songs perfectly. His technique is on point and his shots are very creative; some of his ideas include disappearing acts behind cars and having multiple clones of an artist performing at once. It's easy to see why they've been successful.

A big part 2Lane's excellence lies in collaboration. Linder and Donaldson are a big part of each other's creative process, and they frequently look for input from one another while filming and producing.

"We work pretty closely together," said Donaldson. "Whenever I make a song with an artist, I send it to him quickly to see if it's something he can shoot. He always has input on how to make things better, and I always take that in. When we're on shoot days, he normally has it all planned out, but I come in with a few ideas here and there."

Linder agreed. "We're with each other for both phases of the production. I'll be at his crib while the artist is recording, and if I have any input I'll give it.

Whether he uses it... that's up to him, he's the expert."

The symbiosis between Donaldson and Linder has also become a big reason art-

ists want to work with them. Rapper Wes Calliope, who's worked with the pair in the past, said that it separated 2Lane from other producers and videographers.

"They were courteous, friendly and professional. They both contribute good ideas to the whole process. [They have] good vibes [and are] efficient too. Usually we get a full song done in an hour."

A producer and director who create an efficient, friendly, and professional environment are exactly who Donaldson and Linder want to be. To have artists seek them out from their reputation, to have a song with 2Lane be a status symbol; that's one of their main goals.

"Building a model where artists come to us and know that we can give them a high level song and a high quality video, that's really the dream. [Having them] know that the quality is there. That just comes down to our brand."

Donaldson and Linder will graduate in June, but that doesn't mean that 2Lane will be on hiatus. They'll both be going to University in southern Ontario, and are excited about contributing to Toronto's music scene.

"I'm (Donaldson) going to Guelph, and Josh will be going to the University of Toronto, so we're still close to each other...
[We'd love] to get opportunities in Toronto with big artists there. Eventually, getting [2Lane] out to the U.S, that would be huge. That's where everything's happening."

This spring, our Gryphons showed incredible athletic prowess.

This year's GCI tennis team sent two dynamic duos to OFSAA in Toronto with several other players narrowly missing the cut. In the end, the grade 12 team of Ali Whike and Katie Riis competed in a very talented Girls Open Doubles division while next-gen stars Katelyn Thompson and Max Motamehdi competed in the Mixed Open Doubles draw. Both teams represented Glebe extremely well both on and off the court and made lots of great memories to fuel their future tennis dreams.

The Glebe Track & Field Team travelled to London ON for the OFSAA Championships June 6 - 8. The Highlight of the meet was Derek Strachan capturing gold in the 2000m Steeplechase with a strong move over the last 600m to run away from the field. Other top 10 performances included Saul Taler Senior 1500m (7th) and Waverley Lyons 400m Hurdles (10th).


Going into the OFSAA tournament in Peterborough ranked 8th, girls rugby were determined to prove that they deserved better. In their first, they dispatched the top Barrie team with a 20-5 victory. This set up a date with the #1 ranked team in the province who were the three time defending OFSAA champions, Mayfield. (This was also the team that beat Glebe for gold in 2019 and knocked them out of the tournament in 2022 so Glebe was looking for some revenge.) After a very tough back and forth match, the game was tied 14-14 at the end of regulation and came down to penalty kicks. Both teams missed their first kicks, however Glebe converted on the 2nd attempt followed by a Mayfield miss, sending Glebe to the semi finals with a 17-14 win and dispatching the #1 seed.

Unfortunately for the girls, the win against Mayfield took a heavy toll, losing a few players to injury and heat exhaustion. The team battled hard and showed incredible resolve and toughness but ultimately came up short in the semis and subsequent bronze medal match, finishing 4th overall in the province and bringing home antique bronze. Great season ladies!

On March 26, the badminton tournament at Giselle-Lalonde saw Julia Lavallee win silver, Vinuki Madagammana win bronze in girls' singles, Tina Liu and Nicolas List win gold in mixed doubles, and Joshua Linder and Nicholas Strom win bronze in boys' doubles.

At the Special Olympics finals in Chatham, Glebe got a number of second places... and a fantastic first place in the 200 meter run for Genevieve Noel. Our bocce team also won gold! Everyone had an amazing time at the competition.

On the diamond, Glebe's baseball team was eliminated in the playoffs by a very strong team from Longfields — but little did they know that our infield is dominated by grade 9s, which means this year has been a very good lead off to future championships in that sport.

ARCTIC CIRCLE: OUR TRIP TO NAUJAAT, NU VIA EXPERIENCES CANADA

There were eighteen of us: sixteen students, and two teachers. We took four flights: from Ottawa to Winnipeg, then Rankin onto Naujaat. And for seven days exactly, we glebites lived out our hyperborean fantasies (for the most part).

The locals greeted us warmly; indeed, their good-naturedness would set the tone of the whole trip. There was no shortage of cheerful kids with toothy smiles who followed us around, asking our names and calling us "best friend."

It's best to get the worst out of the way first. As a trip has its ups, it must have its downs. Overlooking some delayed luggage, ours was a horrible form of norovirus that wrecked our stomachs during the early days of the trip. On the worst night, a line of us crouched before the row of baby toilets—we were sleeping in the high school's nursery—vomiting our guts out, repeatedly. At some point, one of the toilets clogged and began to overflow, eventually draining the school's water supply and suspending school for a day. Not the highlight of our trip, to say the least, but after copious gatorades and a day of rest, we

were on our feet again. At least it helped us bond!

Throughout the week, we were lucky to visit many of Naujaat's local sites. At the town hall we met Richard, who graciously told us about his work as an administrative officer, and the ins and outs of managing a northern community. Our Lady of the Snows, Naujaat's Roman Catholic Mission, was certainly one of the most interesting churches we'd seen, what with its qamutik shaped altar, and the polar bear skin and baleen that decorated the walls. At the Co-Op and Northern, we bought gifts for our families and bonded over our mutual shock at certain price tags; "Sixty-five dollars for a pack of soda?!"

Although we may have been thousands of kms from G.C.I., we still ended up spending a lot of time at school. Tuugaalik High School was where we were put up, and spent many boisterous hours sprinting recklessly down hallways in games of tag or conducting elaborate rolling chair relay races. We also visited Tusarvik, Naujaat's elementary school, where we were greeted like bona fide celebrities by the schoolchildren.

These have all been insights into the lives of arctic people. But what of the arctic? There are no words, it must be said, to describe the vastness of the land that surrounded us and the sheerawe it inspired. A land of endless rolling white, nearly unchanging but for the hints of mossy rock that nodded to its summer form. A land beautiful, yet unforgiving. For it wasn't just the cold that might do you in, but a slip between the ice or the claws of a creature who we saw stretched out on railings

as we walked around town.

It's easy to define a place by its dangers, but our two trips on the lands were undisputed favourites. We were pulled out of town on sleds attached to ski-doos, which bumped ferociously (and that is not put lightly).

The first outing was spent ice fishing. When we weren't passing the reel around in search of arctic char or carp, we sheltered in an igloo and hiked the surrounding hills. On the second outing, we were pulled across the bay towards Harbour Island, where, in the old days, bowhead whalers docked their ships. In fact, there are still carvings left behind by these men; "Perseverance, 1885" was one, and below that there was an etching of a whale. We found this fascinating; for in a world where history marks places that shift and grow, our Harbour Island was identical to theirs, despite the gap of time.

We saw no living, breathing whales, but visited a formidable set of Bowhead bones during our time on the bay. In truth, our sightings of arctic wildlife were limited to their skins, except for one of us lucky enough to go see Caribou in their natural environment with her exchange partner. That, and chance glimpses of seals from the back of our sled as we returned to Naujaat across the bay. We ran out each time, but they had already disappeared beneath the ice.


Before long, we'd disappeared too...
not beneath the ice, but to the sky.

"So long, Naujaat, you were unforgettable." We'll likely never see it again. But our trip is not yet over. At the end of May, students from Naujaat will come and visit us. Our home may not boast tundras or northern lights (oh yes, we saw those too!), but perhaps to them, it'll be just as wondrous. We shall see.






MUSIC REVIEW: MATT MAYS & EL TORPEDO 9TH ANNIVERSARY

Matt Mays & El Torpedo dropped their self-titled debut album on May 14, 2014. Let's mark its 9th anniversary with a review. The album, boasting 14 tracks, introduces us to Matt Mays' hit, "Cocaine Cowgirl."

- "The Plan" keeps things flowing with its smooth vocals and lyrics. (7/10)

- "St-Georges Lane" reminisces on past loves that never came to fruition and boasts catchy hooks. (8/10)
- "Move your mind" lacks uniqueness, with repetitive beats and average lyrics, falling short compared to others. (5/10)
- "What Are We Going To Do Come The Month Of September" stands out with its heavy beat and Neil Young-esque guitar. (7/10)
- "Good People" uplifts with its repetitive beat but feels somewhat lacking. (5/10) "Lost Souls" shines with insightful lyrics and a catchy chorus. (6/10)
- "It Don't Matter" brings classic rock vibes and catchy lyrics, making it an entertaining song. (7/10)
- "On The Hood" contends for the album's best with impactful lyrics and matching guitar riffs. (9/10)
- "Time Of Your Life" offers original rock vibes and a killer guitar solo, though not the album's peak. (8/10)
- Closing with "Wicked Come Winter," it ends on a strong note with its powerful vocals and beat. (7/10)

Overall, Matt Mays & El Torpedo delivers more hits than misses, showcasing Mays' standout talent. As a Canadian underdog in a sea of big names, Mays earns a solid 8.5/10 for this album. I would certainly recommend giving it a listen. Who knows, you might find a new favourite song.

The Tortured Poets Department (TTPD), is the magnum opus of Taylor Swift's career thus far, and a triumphant reflection on the last 17 years of her life. What's more than that, Swift managed to pull off a surprise double album drop, releasing 31 brand new songs in one night, right in the middle of her record-shattering Eras Tour.

However, TTPD was received with initial mixed reviews, as many longtime fans took to the internet to express their disappointment with the album, mere hours after it had dropped. Within days, consensus had shifted, and many people online admitted that the album had "grown on them". This phenomenon is perpetuated by social media platforms like TikTok, which are great because they allow fans to access all kinds of music, engage directly with it, and interact with one another about it. However, by isolating 30 second clips, fans can dissect each and every part of a song, even though they don't want to talk about what the song means to them personally—only what it might mean to the artist.

This makes TTPD Swift's most clever work yet. She put out a collection of songs that was simply too large to be summed up in 30 seconds online, and in doing so has









expertly criticized the way modern media consumes music. The most interesting subject of the album has nothing to do with any breakup, it is her open critique of her own fans, and the explicit passing on of her songs to the public. In "But Daddy I Love Him", Swift calls out her fans for feeling free to publicly express their opinions on her private relationships, in lyrics such as "I'll tell you something about my good name/It's mine alone to disgrace". Again in "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart", Swift seems to detail her experience performing on her Eras Tour, and the delivery of the lyric "All the pieces of me shattered as the crowd was chanting 'MORE" carries initial shock value to a first time listener.

The final track on TTPD, "The Manuscript" is the ultimate lesson Swift hopes for her fans to take away from the album. "One last souvenir from my trip to your shores/Now and then I reread the manuscript/But the story isn't mine anymore" are the closing lines of the album, in which Swift fully passes on the songs, trying to tell us that she's moved on and hopes we can too.

SUMMER RECIPES

With the end of the school year just around the corner, the excitement for summer continues to grow. If you happen to be bored at home on a rainy day, try out some of these summer recipes! They're sure to be delicious!

LEMON BLUEBERRY BREAD

INGREDIENTS:

- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup unsalted butter melted
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons fresh grated lemon zest
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- ½ cup milk
- 1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries (I used fresh)
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F and line a 9"x 5" loaf pan with parchment paper.
- In a medium bowl, whisk the flour, baking powder and salt, and set aside.
- 3. In another bowl, blend the melted butter, sugar, eggs, vanilla, lemon zest and lemon juice.

- 4. While slowly mixing, add the flour mixture and milk.
- 5. Add the blueberries to the batter and gently but quickly stir, by hand, to combine.
- 6. Pour batter into the prepared pan and bake for 55-65 minutes.
- 7. Prepare the glaze by whisking together the melted butter, powdered sugar, lemon juice and vanilla.

FOUR BEAN SALAD

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 (15 oz) can of black beans
- 1 (15 oz) can of garbanzo beans
- 1 (15 oz) can of kidney beans
- 1 (15 oz) can of cannellini (or navy) beans
- 2 cups bell peppers (yellow, orange and red), diced small
- ¼ cup pepperoncini (or banana) peppers, diced
- ½ cup black or kalamata olives, sliced in half

- 1/3 cup red onion, diced
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved (or quartered)
- ¼ cup fresh parsley, chopped
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro, chopped

DRESSING:

- ½ cup olive oil
- ¼ cup red wine vinegar
- 1-2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- ½ teaspoon celery salt
- ½ teaspoon sea salt
- fresh black pepper to taste



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. In a large colander, drain and thoroughly rinse all the beans.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients for the dressing *except* the oil. Whisk quickly and slowly drizzle in the olive oil until the dressing is emulsified.
- 3. Add the beans, peppers, olives, onion and tomatoes and toss until combined. Add the parsley and cilantro and toss gently.
- 4. Refrigerate at least 1-2 hours before serving.

STRAWBERRY RHUBARB CRISP

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup (140g) all-purpose flour
- 4 cup (80g) old-fashioned rolled oats
- ¼ cup (160g) packed light-brown sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt

- 10 tablespoons (141g) unsalted butter, cold and diced into small pieces
- 1½ lbs fresh strawberries, hulled and cut into ¾-inch pieces (about 4½ cups)
- 1 lb fresh rhubarb, sliced into ½-inch pieces (about 4 cups)
- ¾ cup (160g) granulated sugar
- 1½ teaspoons orange zest
- 2 tablespoons (30ml) orange juice
- 2½ tablespoons (22g) corn starch
- vanilla ice cream,
 for serving (optional)



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F. Grease a 13" by 9" baking dish.
- 2. In a mixing bowl whisk together flour, oats, brown sugar and salt.
- Add butter and rub into mixture until no large clumps of butter remain. Transfer to the refrigerator while preparing the filling.
- 4. Add strawberries, rhubarb, orange juice and orange zest to a large mixing bowl. Whisk together sugar and cornstarch and pour into bowl with fruit. Toss mixture in bowl to evenly coat.
- Pour strawberry mixture into prepared baking dish. Sprinkle crumble over top.
- 6. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes.

Our *Gazette* team would like to thank the teachers, student organizers and all the volunteers for helping bring back this important tradition that demonstrates our level of care for the community.






